




Celebrating Student Success: A Year of Achievement, Creativity, and Community

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Athletic Achievements

From the first kickoff in fall to the final whistle of spring, our student-athletes brought energy, teamwork, and sportsmanship to every game. The varsity football team made history by winning their first-round playoff game, only the second team do this in 158 years. The all-time leading rushing record was broken by Jaxon Covell. During the winter season, the Boys and Girls Swim Team sent nine swimmers and one diver to the PIAA State Championships. Joe Herman, Isabella Mucha, Olivia Mucha and Evan Slocum qualified for individual events. Many of



our THS records were broken this season. With our spring seasons ending soon, THS will send two athletes to PIAA Track and Field Championship this weekend, Aaron Burrows and Lane Ongley. Both THS baseball and softball teams qualified for the playoffs and will play in the next few days.

A new tradition that was started this year is a formal signing night to recognize student athletes who have committed to play at the collegiate level. Beyond the trophies and titles, our athletic programs emphasized leadership and perseverance—lessons that our students will carry with them long after they leave the field.

Artistic Expression

The arts came alive this year with vibrant performances, exhibitions, and creative milestones. Our district's high

school musical, *Hadestown-Teen Edition*, and middle school musical, *Finding Nemo Jr.*, dazzled audiences and involved over 100 students in



roles ranging from actors and musicians to set designers and crew members. In addition to the annual art show at Titusville High School, the art teachers of our District were celebrated this spring with a gallery show at the Education and Training Center at Pitt-Titusville.



Music programs flourished as well. There were three students who qualified for the PMEA All-State Festival this spring. Jenna Crocker qualified for the All-State Wind Ensemble on percussion. Luke Keebler performed as a tenor I with the All-State Choir and Evan Slocum qualified on the Euphonium in the All-State Concert Band. The Titusville Area School District was recognized again for 2025 from the NAMM Foundation as one of the Best Communities for Music Education. Elementary, middle and high school students performed concerts through the year as well as a special concert in March celebrating Music in Our Schools Month. Through every brushstroke, note, and step, our students expressed their unique voices and brought joy to our community.



Community Service and Collaboration

Perhaps the most inspiring part of the year was the way students gave back. Collectively, students across all grade levels provided community service. From organizing donation drives and volunteering at community agencies to tutoring younger students and participating in roadside cleanup events and working as student poll workers for our local elections, their efforts made a meaningful impact.

Business Department new Sports Marketing/Management class

This year, Titusville High-School's Business Department introduced a new Sports Marketing/Management class into the curriculum. Teaching this class is Mr. Andrew Pikna, who joined Titusville High-School in the 2023-2024 academic year. Prior to coming to THS, Mr. Pikna was a Division I baseball coach at Winthrop University. Before his stint at Winthrop, he worked for West Virginia University Athletics Marketing while earning his Master's degree in Sport Business. During his time at WVU and Winthrop, he made several connections in the industry that he continues to maintain.

Mr. Pikna has brought back 16 of these industry professionals to be Guest Speakers for his Sports Marketing/Management class this year, with more scheduled to speak. When asked why he felt this was important for his students, Mr. Pikna said "the opportunity for these students to hear from these industry professionals is invaluable. My goal of the Sports Marketing/Management class was to introduce the students to a career field that doesn't get a ton of exposure at the high-school level. These students are hearing first-hand accounts from several different segments of the industry and receiving cool and interesting stories from those who have lived it, along with an insightful dynamic learning experience."

Andrew Wright is currently the Minor League Field Coordinator for the Boston Red Sox. Andrew was Mr. Pikna's college baseball coach, and Mr. Pikna speaks very highly of him. He came to speak last year for a few of Mr. Pikna's classes, and the feedback was resounding from the students. His experience and overall attitude on life is one to be studied and leaves quite an impact on anyone he speaks with.


Gifted Competitions contd
