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Enhancing School Safety: An overview of TASD and PCCD Safety Grant Initiatives



As part of the Titusville Area School District's ongoing commitment to ensuring a safe and supportive environment for our students, we are excited to share important updates regarding our participation in the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD) safety grants. These initiatives aim to enhance mental health support, bolster school resource officer programs, and conduct comprehensive safety assessments within our district.

Mental Health Support for Students

One of the key components of the PCCD safety grants is the enhancement of mental health services through the hiring of dedicated social workers. These professionals play a crucial role in addressing the emotional and psychological needs of our students. By providing counseling, crisis intervention, and support for mental wellness, we aim to create a safe space where students feel valued and understood. This initiative not only fosters a positive school climate but also equips students with the tools they need to navigate life's challenges.

Strengthening School Resource Officers (SROs)

The grant also supports the integration of a School Resource Officer (SRO) into our schools. SROs are specially trained law enforcement officers who serve as a vital bridge between law enforcement and the school community. Their presence helps ensure a secure environment, deterring potential threats while also providing a resource for students and staff alike. By fostering positive relationships with students, SROs can serve as mentors and role models, further contributing to a culture of safety and respect. We are happy to welcome Titusville Police Department Officer Fuller to our schools.

Competitive Safety Grant and Risk Assessments

In addition to enhancing mental health and law enforcement resources, the district submitted for the PCCD competitive safety grant aimed at addressing specific security needs. The Titusville Area School District identified the main entrances at Titusville High School and Titusville Middle School. The buildings' entrances will be renovated to include safety vestibules. The Titusville Area School District was awarded \$450,000 to address these upgrades in order to implement advanced safety measures. A key aspect of these initiatives involves conducting thorough risk and vulnerability assessments of all District buildings. The District is undergoing an assessment at this time in coordination with the Pennsylvania State Police. By evaluating our current safety protocols and identifying areas for improvement, we can create a more resilient and responsive school environment.

What This Means for Our Community

The collective efforts supported by the Titusville Area School District and the PCCD safety grants represent a comprehensive approach to school safety. By focusing on mental health, reinforcing law enforcement presence, and continuously assessing our safety protocols, we are taking proactive steps to protect our students and staff.

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


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2024-2025 Titusville Area School District



<u>Title I</u>

Title I is a federal program that provides funding to school districts with a high percentage of children from low-income families to help ensure equal opportunities for all children. All students in grades K4 - 8 are considered Title I students within TASD. The following is a breakdown of how Titusville Area School District will be spending our federal funding for the 2024 - 2024 school year:

Budget Summary

- ⇒ **\$965,117** Salaries and Benefits for (5) Reading specialists, (4) Reading Aides, (3) Math Aides, (1) Elementary Counselor, (1) Social Worker (United Way), and (2) Administrative Supports
- \Rightarrow \$95,528 Homeless set aside, Family Engagement, take-home books, SWPBIS and other resources
- \Rightarrow **\$107,136** Reading support / training / coaching

\$1,167,781 - Total funding awarded for 2024-2025 school year

(a funding decrease of \$32,277 from the 2023-2024 school year)

Breakdown of Title I student funding per school

Each building received funding based on student enrollment to ensure equality. The buildings were ranked according to need, determined by free and reduced meal status of building student population.

- \Rightarrow Early Childhood Learning Center allocated \$1,692.31 per pupil (F&R = 76.15%)
- \Rightarrow Main Street Elementary School allocated \$1,689.02 per pupil (F&R = 71.93%)
- \Rightarrow Pleasantville Elementary School allocated \$1,679.10 per pupil (F&R = 63.21%)
- \Rightarrow Hydetown Elementary allocated \$1,612.90 per pupil (F&R = 62.94%)
- \Rightarrow Titusville Middle School allocated \$214.02 per pupil (F&R = 62.71%)

Title I grant performance goals for the 2024-2025 school year

- 1. Improve Reading & Math Literacy skills within students in grades K4 to 8.
- 2. Increase family partnerships and involvement within our schools.

Updates to the School Wide Positive Behavior Support Program – Bee Bucks!!

The Elementary Student Assistance Program at the ECLC is made up of a variety of teachers, the nurse, the guidance counselor, the school resource coordinator, and the principal. Each year this team looks at the effectiveness of our School Wide Positive Behavior Support Program. For years, the ECLC has utilized the Bee Card system to reward students for positive behaviors demonstrated at school. The team decided to revamp the program for the 2024-2025 school year to incorporate some financial literacy and bring the program up-to-date with the world we live in. The students can earn "Bee Bucks" for their positive behaviors at school. Each Thursday, the students can count their bucks and decide to cash them in for prizes from the school store "Beezon" or save them for bigger prizes when they earn more bucks. Then on Friday, the "Beezon" delivery person (Mrs. Nichols – the guidance counselor) drops the prizes off at the classroom door. It has truly been amazing to see how excited the students are about this, and we really have been impressed with the number of students wanting to save their bucks. It has been a great learning experience so far.

Raising the Flag



BUSINESS DEPARTMENT EXPANSION

Our business department is expanding to integrate industry-relevant skills across all areas of business and computer science. We have recently launched a new sports management and marketing program, providing students with hands-on experience in organizing and promoting athletic events for all ages. Recently, the students organized and promoted an event called "Kick it to the Max," featuring a competition with one student from each grade, two female adults, and two male adults, competing for a prize basket valued at \$350. This event was designed to offer students valuable, resume-building experience in the field of sports management.

They are focusing on manufacturing automation, learning to work with coordinates, identify objects, and manage object movement. As they progress, the students will develop machine-learning models to recognize the shapes and colors of objects and manipulate them accordingly.
